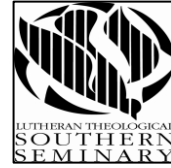

DESCRIPTION OF COURSES OFFERED January 4-14, 2011

CM 246 Death, Dying and Grief - Dr. Tony Everett
Contributions by various professions are examined to develop appropriate pastoral ministry to persons experiencing loss and grief resulting from illness, death, divorce, relocation, work change, etc. The theology of loss is considered along with helpful methods of grief management.

HT205 History of the Diaconate - Dr Susan McArver
The history of diaconal ministry in the church, its present expressions, and its future possibilities. Students will have considerable time to examine and discern their own calls to ministry, as well as opportunity for individual and community spiritual disciplines essential to all Christians, particularly to rostered leaders.

ID 405/405- Israel and Palestine Study Tour - Dr. Lamontte Luker
A cross-cultural immersion in the Holy Land including discussions and interaction with Israelis, Palestinians, Lutheran and Catholic leaders, ecumenical visits and dialogues, biblical archeology, and focused spiritual formation. Students will experience the Bible as well as the current situation involving Israeli Jews, Arab citizens of Israel or Jerusalem, and Palestinians in the West Bank. Three foci comprise the course: 1. biblical, archeological, geographical; 2. cross-cultural, political, ecumenical; 3. spiritual retreat.

Note: If taking for cross cultural credit most sign up for ID 405-1 (2 Credits) AND CC (1 Credit). If cross cultural not needed sign up for ID 405 only, which is a 3 credit hour course.

CM 110 Introduction to Military Chaplaincy
This seminar is designed to examine the unique ministry of military chaplains. It will help students begin a discernment process regarding military chaplaincy or to gain a better understanding of this specialized ministry. The seminar will include discussions with retired and active duty chaplains, visits to Ft Jackson and the chaplain schools, and discussion/lectures on history, ethics, theology and practice of military chaplains during war and peace time.
